A LASTING TRIBUTE

Since 1984, the Shemer Art Center has been proud to serve as a lasting tribute to a woman who devoted her life to improving the quality of life for all Phoenicians and Arizonans. Her gift has become for its visitors a place of refuge to regroup and renew their spirits, creativity & imagination.

We are extremely proud to have been chosen one of the Points of Pride for the City of Phoenix.

Born April, 19, 1919, in Ames, Iowa, Martha Shemer was the youngest child of Dr. John M. Evvard and his wife, Mattie. Along with her siblings, John and Mary Margaret, she spent an idyllic childhood taking nature hikes, studying the trees, the birds, the butterflies, and the stars. In 1933, due to her father's health, the family moved to Phoenix, Arizona, where she attended Phoenix Union High School. Upon graduation in 1937, she married Jack Shemer and raised a family of two boys. Throughout their marriage, Martha bought and sold real estate. When she first saw the historic home in Arcadia, she proclaimed "someone needs to save this beautiful, historic



home and grounds." Martha Shemer purchased and donated the three-acre lot and historic home, first built in 1919, to the City of Phoenix. She had two dreams: to preserve the property and to provide an arts education facility and community center for the citizens of Arizona. In 1984, the City dedicated the facility as the Shemer Art Center and Museum.



CLASSES: CERAMICS

INTRO TO THROWING, Alan Jones



This class will focus on the basic skills of wheel throwing - centering, opening and pulling vessels - followed by learning to form cylinders, bowls and cups. Students will also learn to evaluate form and how form serves a vessel's function. Students will learn about clay properties while working in stoneware clay and high-temperature glazes. There is a \$20 supply fee for clay and glazes.

Level: Beginner to Intermediate Class: AJ-13 – Thursdays, 1:00pm-4:00pm 1/16-3/6/14 (8 sessions) \$225

CLASSES: CERAMICS CONT.

INTRO TO HANDBUILDING, Alan Jones



Handbuilding is the fundamental construction method for creating sculptural and functional ceramic forms. Students will undertake a variety of projects including slab construction, round and flat coil construction, pinch-forming methods, surface texturing and carving. Students will work in high-temperature stoneware clay and will be introduced to glazing techniques. There is a \$20 supply fee for clay and glazes.

Level: Beginner to Intermediate Class: AJ-15 – Thursdays, 6:00pm-9:00pm 1/16-3/6/14 (8 sessions) \$225

MINI-MICRO DWELLINGS, Sandra Luehrsen



Our homes and workspaces express a lot about who we are as individuals. So will our fired clay micro-mini dwellings! You may draw inspiration from your own home, abodes from distant lands, nests made by creatures, or invent a structure purely from your imagination. For inspiration, Luchrsen will present a slide show of actual dwellings and dwelling sculptures and demonstrate basic clay forming techniques. No micro-mini dwelling will be taller or wider than 8" so participants at all levels of experience can successfully build. After your clay sculptures are bisque fired, you'll return to enhance the color and surfaces of your dwelling(s) with glazes.

CLASSES: DRAWING

BASIC DRAWING, Elliott Everson



Drawing is a learned skill based on hand-eye coordination. Anyone can learn to draw, and it is a basic tool needed for all classes offered at the Southwest School of Art. Through free-hand drawing, students will render three-dimensional objects - using drawing principles of line, shape, value, texture, perspective and composition - in an enjoyable and relaxed atmosphere. Bring an 18 by 24-inch drawing pad, a selection of graphite pencils and an eraser; additional materials will be discussed during the first class.

Level: Beginner to Intermediate Class: EE-12 – Tuesdays, 9:00am-12:00pm 1/14-3/4/14 (8 sessions) \$225 EE-14– Wednesdays, 1:00-4:00pm 1/29-3/5/14(6 sessions) \$165

COLORED PENCIL DRAWING STUDIO, Elliott Everson



This multi-level class is for beginners with some drawing background or for experienced studentartists who would like to refresh their drawing skills. Topics will explore value, space, composition and concept, as well as different drawing styles and materials. Students will move beyond using drawing merely to render objects accurately, and will come to view drawing as a challenging vehicle for expression of both form and narrative. Bring a sketchbook or drawing pad (size 11 by 14 or 18 by 24-inches) and a selection of colored pencils and an eraser; additional materials will be discussed during the first class.

Level: Intermediate Class: EE-13 – Wednesdays, 9:00am-12:00pm 1/15-3/4/14 (8 sessions) \$225 THE FIGURE IN DRAWING AND PAINTING, Jack Adams



This course offers a combination of traditional and alternative approaches to the body in art. Students will explore various interpretations of the human form, from representation to abstraction. To develop their personal style, students will work from live models and personal images, using a variety of water-based media and experimental techniques. Bring an 18 by 24-inch drawing pad, a selection of pencils and an eraser to the first class; additional materials will be discussed at that time. Model fees are included.

Level: Intermediate/Advanced Class: JA-2 – Fridays, 3/21-5/9/14 10:00am-2:00pm (8 sessions) \$325

COLLAGE 101: PAINTING WITH PAPER, Karen Holloway



In this two-day collage workshop. Students will explore traditional and unconventional approaches to expand their definition of collage. Preferred supplies, alternative materials, techniques, and processes as well as color theory and personal imagery will be covered. Students will leave with a finished project and several new tips to advance their practice.

CLASSES: PAINTING

BASIC PAINTING, Sue Hunter



This is a fundamentals class in the format of a guided journey to free creative potential. It will begin with an exercise to loosen up the student then allow them to use this exercise to enhance the painting. Incorporated in the class structure will be lessons on color, value, and composition. Allowing the participants to learn painting through doing and not just seeing or reading.

Level: Beginner to Intermediate SH-11 – Tuesdays, 9:00am-12:00pm 1/14-3/11/14 [NO CLASS 2/18] (8 sessions), \$225

MIXED MEDIA ACRYLIC, Agustin Vargas



Acrylics can mimic all paint mediums in a less toxic way. Students will discover how to layer and develop a painting's surface. Since acrylics work equally well together, there are fewer rules regarding how a painting's depth can be built. To get the most from the variety of acrylic mediums, fool-proof and low-tech methods will cover how to simulate epoxy, lacquer, and open painting like oil. No previous painting experience required, but some art experience expected.

Level: Beginner to Intermediate Class: AV-3 – Tuesdays, 1:00pm-4:00pm 1/14-3/4/14 (8 sessions) \$225

OPEN STUDIO PAINTING, Cynthia Peterson



Work from personal themes and symbols, abstraction, or photographs. Paint or draw to complete unfinished work or start some- thing new in a relaxed environment. Class will be tailored individually to each student's needs. Participants can work from varied life sources and imagination in oil, watercolor, or acrylic. Come be creative - all abilities welcomed!

Level: Beginner to Intermediate Class: CP-14 – Tuesdays, 1:00pm-4:00pm 2/11-3/4/14 (4 sessions), \$110

REPRESENTATIONAL PAINTING IN OIL, Cynthia Peterson



Investigate both traditional and modern techniques of representational painting. Students will become familiar with the many materials used in oil painting - with emphasis on layering oils through glazing - and will examine how to cross and manipulate opaque and transparent paint with mediums. This class will also focus on composition and the principles for completing a well-designed painting. Please bring a sketchbook and pencil to the first class; a supplies list will be provided at that time. Prerequisite: Some drawing experience helpful.

Level: Beginner to Intermediate Class: CP-13– Tuesdays, 6:00pm-8:30pm 11/12-12/17 (6 sessions) \$150

CLASSES: PAINTING

PAINTING STUDIO, Sue Hunter



This class is designed to develop and clarify the student's painting style and expand their technical skills. Sue will tailor discussions and demonstrations to the developing needs of each student-artist. As the class progresses, students will have the opportunity to learn ways of adding other media to their paintings. Prerequisite: Previous painting experience. Bring a blank canvas or a work in progress, images or a sample of finished work, and painting supplies you currently use to the first class; suggestions for additional materials will be discussed at that time.

Level: All levels SH-12 - Wednesdays, 9:00am-12:00pm 1/15-3/12/14 [NO CLASS 2/19] (7 sessions), \$225

PAINTNG WITH PASTELS, Donna Stenger



This class will begin by exploring pastels, using both conventional and experimental techniques, and then make the leap to combining pastels with other mediums. Investigate the flexibility of different pastel types - traditional, soft, hard, pencil and oil. Combinations with oil and acrylic mediums, along with other materials and types support structures will lead students to explore the relationship between technique and concept.

Level: Beginning to Intermediate Class: DS-9 – Wednesdays, 12:30pm-3:30pm, 1/8-2/26/14 (8 sessions) \$225

DISCOVER AND DEVELOP A UNIQUE PAINTING STYLE, Judith Spitz



This class is structured for ALL levels of artistic endeavor. In it Judith will demonstrate in oil and/ or pastel while identifying basic painting techniques such as shape, color, temperature, edges, composition and perspective, in her own unique style of painting. Students will learn these techniques and are encouraged to build their own style of painting in this fun, highly motivational environment.

Level: All levels Class: JS-2 – Thursdays, 9:00am-12:00pm 2/13-3/6/14 (4 sessions) \$110

INTERMEDIATE WATERCOLOR PAINTING, Agustin Vargas



Have you taken watercolor classes before or have basic understanding of watercolor techniques? Continue to explore watercolor techniques, composition, and color while learning to create a body of artwork. Prerequisite: Watercolor experience

Level: Intermediate Class: AV-4 – Thursdays, 1:00pm-4:00pm 2/13-3/6/14 (4 sessions) \$110

DRAWING & PAINTING PORTRAITS, Amber Wanielista



Learn step-by-step techniques for drawing and painting portraits. Class instruction will include analyzing tonal value and mixing flesh-tone colors. Students should bring drawing supplies they currently use, a sketchbook and pencil to the first class; suggestions for additional materials will be discussed at that time. Model fees are included. The last four sessions include a live model. Prerequisite: Previous drawing experience preferred.

Level: All Levels Class: AW-5 – Tuesdays, 6:00pm-8:30pm 1/21-3/4/14 (7 sessions) \$200

$\label{eq:watercolor} WATERCOLOR\ PAINTING,\ John \ Erwin$



This class is for the first-time painter, as well as the student who would like to learn more about the various approaches to painting in this very direct medium. Demonstrations will be given each week showing students how to paint wet-on-wet washes, dry-on-wet washes and with a dry brush. Color theory as it relates to watercolor will be discussed. Intermediate level students, while developing an independent vision, will learn ways to improve their painting skills through advance demonstration, practice and critique.

BEGINNING DIGITAL PHOTOGRAPHY, Alan Staats



Start off on the right foot in digital photography, or fill in gaps in your basic skills. This workshop introduces the technical aspects of digital photography and the concepts behind photographic images. The emphasis is on skill building, creative picture making, editing and evaluating images. Students leave with a thorough knowledge of what the camera's controls do and which ones are best for each style of shooting. Instruction includes apertures, shutters, equivalent exposures, using available light, portraiture and other conceptual topics. The atmosphere in this class is one of exploration, practice and play. This class is for anyone new to digital SLR, or for anyone interested in fully exploring all its functions.

Level: Beginner Class #AS-2 – Tuesdays, 6:00pm-8:30pm 2/11-3/4/14 (4 sessions) \$100

ART PHOTOGRAPHY, Michel Sarda



What is Portrait? What is Figure? Possibly 90% of all pictures taken are portraits — showing people in an infinite diversity of situations and locations. Class will discuss the difference between a snapshot, a portrait, and figure photography. The human form is central to the history and the very meaning of of art, a mirror to our own consciousness. Every human body is unique — what artist/ sculptor John Waddell defines as the "beauty of individual differences." Studens will work with a live model under various angles and lights.

CLASSES: PRINTMAKING & JEWELRY

PRINTMAKING SKILLS, Larry Nisula



An open studio class with instruction on using silkscreen, etching, and letterpresses. Various types of prints will be covered including: lino/woodcut, intaglio, screenprinting on paper or fabric, and typography. Basic materials will be supplied.

Level: All Levels Class: LN-14 -- Fridays, 10:00am-1:00pm, 2/14-3/7/14 (4 sessions) \$110

BASIC METAL & ENAMELING SKILLS, Larry Nisula



This class is all about introducing students to basic and fundamental techniques and tools used to create unique jewelry and metalsmithed objects. Students will design and make either a silver pendant, banded ring, or pair of earrings with enameling enhancements. Topics covered will include sawing, basic forming, silver-soldering, surface embellishment and surface finishing. Materials are provided.

Level: Beginning to Intermediate Class: LN-7 – Friday, 10:00am-1:00pm, 1/24/14 (1 session) \$40

TORCH-FIRED ENAMELING, Michelle Startzman



Enameling is an ancient technique of fusing glass to a metal surface. Students will learn the basics of torch-fired enameling, with specific techniques including sifting, stencils, sgraffito, drawing techniques, and more. This class is designed to give the beginning student a strong foundation in enamel techniques with the use of a torch. There is a \$45 material fee.

Level: Beginning to Intermediate MZ-2 – Saturday & Sunday, 10:00am-3:00pm 3/1 & 3/2 (2 sessions) \$100 MZ-3 – Saturday & Sunday, 10:00am-3:00pm 4/5 & 4/6 (2 sessions) \$100

ELLIOTT EVERSON

is an artist that has been living in Arizona most of his life. He derives much of his inspiration from the desert around us and uses colored pencil to capture the textures and brilliance of the plants and animals. Each drawing consists of layer upon layer of color, to bring out the many subtle hues that nature itself provides. Elliott is a Juried member of the Arizona Artists Guild and a Signature member of the Colored Pencil Society of America and President of the Local Chapter of the CPSA. Elliott graduated from Arizona State University with a Bachelors degree in Art Education. In recent years he has taught drawing and colored pencil classes and workshops in Phoenix and around Arizona. He is a recipient of several local and national awards for his colored pencil work.

JOHN ERWIN

has been painting in watercolors for over twenty years. He is a juried member of the Arizona Artist Guild, the Arizona Watercolor Society, and a signature member of the Contemporary Watercolorist of Arizona. He has studied locally with Diane Maxey, Dick Phillips, with Robert E. Woods and Milford Zornes. He also has three degrees from ASU and currently teaches in the Paradise Valley School District. John's paintings reflect his love of color, details, and design. His love of travel is often seen in his paintings as he hopes to transport the viewer to a world of exciting color and romance.

SUE HUNTER

was born in Arkansas but has lived in Arizona since 1960 and thinks of Arizona as home. The lovely desert colors, wide, open spaces, and diverse landscapes of the Southwest provide her with endless subject matter for her paintings. Color is an important aspect of Sue's art that is reflected in her impressionistic style. She works in pastel, oil, watercolor, and acrylics, graduated from Western International University and has studied art at Scottsdale Artists School, Scottsdale Community College, with local art instructors and has attended numerous workshops locally and in Europe. She had an article written about her work in the March, 2010 issue of Southwest Art. Her work is included in many private and public collections and has been juried in the Scottsdale Artists School's Best and Brightest show numerous times. She is a juried member of Arizona Artists Guild, Arizona Watercolor Association, Arizona Pastel Artists Association - Signature, Contemporary Watercolors, Mid-Southern Watercolorists - Signature, Scottsdale Artists League, Sonoran Artists League and Degas Pastel Society. She teaches classes in watercolor, acrylic, oil and pastel at Paradise Valley Community College, Shemer Art Center and Terravita Art Club.

JULIE GILBERT POLLARD

is the author of *Brilliant Color* (North Light Books, 2009) and *Watercolor Unleashed!* (a self-published "chapter at a time" book, 2010). Additional publications include articles in: *The Artist's Magazine* (May 2010 and September 1987), "How Did You Paint That? 100 Ways to Paint Landscapes", *International Artist* (2004) and *Watercolor* '92, Fall Issue. Gilbert Pollard's two watercolor DVDs were recently released in March, 2011 from North Light Shops / ArtistsNetwork.tv! She has given instruction in watercolor and oil since 1985. She currently conducts classes and workshops at Scottsdale Artists School, Shemer Art Center and Cynthia's Art Asylum in the greater Phoenix area, Highland Valley Studios in California, Dillman's Creative Arts Foundation in Wisconsin and La Romita School of Art in Umbria, Itay. A frequent award winner, her oils and watercolors have hung in numerous juried and gallery exhibits and she is a signature member of the San Diego Watercolor Society. Her work is included in many private and corporate collections and is represented in Arizona by Esprit Decor Gallery in Phoenix & Windrush Gallery in Sedona.

ALAN JONES

has been a full-time studio production potter and ceramic sculptor since 1973. During his career he sold works to museum shops, galleries and department stores across the US. He has also designed sculptural awards for local arts and business organizations. Alan has mastered and innovated techniques in both functional and decorative disciplines including slab and coil (hand and machine formed); extruder, potters wheel and plaster press-mold. Alan has built kilns for himself and others. His firing experience includes: low-fired clay works and surface treatments: pit firing (both above and below ground), raku ware smoke, or saggarfired decorative sculpture. He began teaching the art of his craft in 1993, and has enjoyed the excitement of sharing techniques and concepts with his students ever since.

JIM MITSUI

originally from Seattle, received his M.A. in English (Creative Writing) from the University of Washington. A recipient of a National Endowment for the Arts Fellowship, Jim has had four books of poetry published: *Journal of the Sun*, Copper Canyon Press, 1974; *Crossing the Phantom River*, Graywolf Press, 1978; *After the Long Train*, The Bieler Press (USC); and *From A Three-Cornered World*, University of Washington Press, 1997. He has served as a Poetry Editor and Consultant for Scott-Foresman and HarperCollins Publishers, and has poems published in over 120 magazines, anthologies and textbooks. He has given readings at various venues: Stanford, Sacramento State, Washington State University, the University of Washington, Southern Utah, locally, and Seattle's Bumbershoot Festival with Ken Kesey. A member of Arizona State University's Emeritus College, he teaches at ASU West, Rio Salado College, and Southern New Hampshire University Online.

SHARI KEITH

who is known as instructors The Junk Lady, is a collector of junk extraordinaire. She creates jewelry and art from found objects, and her work has been featured in galleries throughout the U.S. Her unique way of using junk to decorate her home was featured in the Arizona Republic, and almost all of the clothing she wears is recycled. Shari Keith holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree and a Master of Arts degree in Education. She is a Roster Artist for the Arizona Commission on the Arts and works as a teaching artist who shares her passion for the environmental and artistic benefits of using found and discarded items as a medium for creating art.

SANDRA LUERHSEN

earned BA and MA degrees at Northern Illinois University and an MFA degree at Arizona State University. She left a position as an assistant dean at ASU to start her own business. She also teaches 3D design at Mesa Community College in AZ. Several public and private collections hold Luehrsen's work including the Auckland Institute and Museum and the Kamm Teapot Foundation. *The Ceramic Surface Design* Book features Luehrsen's art with ceramic transfers.

CYNTHIA PETERSON

began seriously studying art at Glendale Community College. She was introduced to old master techniques of egg tempera and oil glazing. During a brief residence in Austria, she took a workshop on egg tempera with Wolfgang Manner and Ernst Fuchs. She received her BFA degree from Northern Arizona University where she focused on painting and graphic design. As a graduate student at Arizona State University, she began specializing in water media. Currently she is Adjunct Faculty in Painting / Drawing at Mesa Community College. A desire to branch out has led her to different art venues including the Shemer Art Center and Museum, Brio Fine Arts and Scottsdale Artists School.

LARRY NISULA

A Phoenix native, his sculpture and prints have been collected by the Tucson Museum of Art, the Museum of Northern Arizona University, ASU West, Glendale Community College, and Merchants Press, Poughkeepsie, New York. He has been written up in Who's Who in American Art and Who's Who in the West. He has lectured at Phoenix College on Arts & Books in Review. Larry takes great pride in teaching others to sculpt or the art of printmaking, having taught for over 20 years at the community college level and at the Shemer.

ALAN STAATS

has been a professional photographer and journalist for more than 40 years; his client list has included both local and international galleries, museums and collectors. In addition, he has provided photography for numerous books and hundreds of magazine articles. As much of his collection photography has been done on location, either in the artists' studios or collectors homes, he has developed techniques utilizing lighting and backgrounds that, in his words, "travel well... and light!" After his service in Military Intelligence he returned to school to get a degree from the Art Center College of Design. During the next few years Jack became a member of the New York Society of Illustrators and designed hotels and restaurant in many countries including Doha, Dubai, Abu Dhabi, Cairo, Berlin, Romania, Shanghai, and Singapore, as well as New York City. His latest project is the newly opened CONRAD Hotel in Dubai. Currently, Jack is a member of the Portrait Artists of Arizona, the Arizona Artists Guild, and the ICON studio. As a practicing architect, he operated his own architectural firm in Paris for fifteen years, during which he was involved in drawing, painting, writing, and photography. Through his architectural commissions, world travel and personal interests, he accumulated knowledge in several forms of arts. A writer in both French and English, Sarda has released four photography "coffee table" books on the Phoenix area, and several other publications. Including, *Flying Colors*, a visual homage to the artistry of his friend Patsy Lowry for her extraordinary fabric design. He is currently completing an essay entitled Self-Image Discovery — the healing power of photographic portraiture, and a book on the art of his friend, painter Jim Covarrubias. In 1992, with his wife Donnalee, Michel Sarda established the nonprofit Art Renaissance Initiative, which have been nominated multiple times to the Arizona Governor's Arts Awards for outstanding contribution to the arts, education and culture in Arizona. Sarda lectures regularly at the Shemer on European and local artists and authors.

JOSEPH WOLVES KILL

Joseph Wolves Kill was born in Texas in 1962. He has studied the work of many artists and incorporated his own reflections on these artists into his work in order to portray both strife and success. Joseph is a chameleon: his art changes and fluctuates; he creates new from the old. His bold and vibrant paintings uncover the hidden boundaries between beauty and disturbance. His artwork has been shown throughout the United States, Europe and Japan. Images from his work have been used in advertising and promotion for organizations such as the Intertribal Council of Arizona, Arizona State University's creative writing program, the Arizona Nurse's Association, Scottsdale Leadership Inc., Scottsdale Center for the Performing Arts and ATLATL (National Native Arts Network). Commercially, Joseph has illustrated a children's book, designed a book cover and album cover artwork.

BETH SHOOK

was born on Christmas Eve, 1963, in Jeannette, Pennsylvania. Still, she considers herself a native of the southwest, having lived her most reckless and influential years in El Paso, Texas.
